He does not share the landscape of a nation's identity yet creates an alternate political space that probes and questions the objectives of pre-existing identities. The works of visual artist Anusha Gajaweera in this edition of ARTRA Magazine, '(In)Complete Flowers', is a series of black and white distorted flowers that attempt to transpire the political context of today's society. We find Anusha's works of art presenting a refreshing perspective of political aspects in his subversion of flowers; those intending to present the dark and melancholic rigidity of the sociopolitical environment and its effect on one's soul. His canvas of distorted and outlandish flowers are symbolic in expressing the idea of human destruction while boldly conveying its association with political contexts.
